The Book of James outlines the faith walk through *genuine religion* (1:1-27), *genuine faith* (2:1-3:12) and *genuine wisdom* (3:13-5:20). # Reading: Psalm 39:1-5 / James 3:1-12 / Matthew 16:13-17

### Psalm 39:1-5

<sup>1</sup> I said, 'I will watch my ways and keep my tongue from sin; I will put a muzzle on my mouth while in the presence of the wicked.'<sup>2</sup> So I remained utterly silent, not even saying anything good. But my anguish increased;<sup>3</sup> my heart grew hot within me. While I meditated, the fire burned; then I spoke with my tongue: <sup>4</sup> 'Show me, Lord, my life's end and the number of my days; let me know how fleeting my life is.<sup>5</sup> You have made my days a mere handbreadth; the span of my years is as nothing before you. Everyone is but a breath, even those who seem secure.

### James 3:1-12

#### Taming the tongue

**3** Not many of you should become teachers, my fellow believers, because you know that we who teach will be judged more strictly. <sup>2</sup> We all stumble in many ways. Anyone who is never at fault in what they say is perfect, able to keep their whole body in check. <sup>3</sup> When we put bits into the mouths of horses to make them obey us, we can turn the whole animal. <sup>4</sup> Or take ships as an example. Although they are so large and are driven by strong winds, they are steered by a very small rudder wherever the pilot wants to go. <sup>5</sup>Likewise, the tongue is a small part of the body, but it makes great boasts. Consider what a great

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forest is set on fire by a small spark. <sup>6</sup> The tongue also is a fire, a world of evil among the parts of the body. It corrupts the whole body, sets the whole course of one's life on fire, and is itself set on fire by hell. <sup>7</sup>All kinds of animals, birds, reptiles and sea creatures are being tamed and have been tamed by mankind, <sup>8</sup> but no human being can tame the tongue. It is a restless evil, full of deadly poison. <sup>9</sup> With the tongue we praise our Lord and Father, and with it we curse human beings, who have been made in God's likeness. <sup>10</sup> Out of the same mouth come praise and cursing. My brothers and sisters, this should not be. <sup>11</sup> Can both fresh water and salt water flow from the same spring? <sup>12</sup> My brothers and sisters, can a fig-tree bear olives, or a grapevine bear figs? Neither can a salt spring produce fresh water.

#### Matthew 16:13-17

Peter declares that Jesus is the Messiah

<sup>13</sup> When Jesus came to the region of Caesarea Philippi, he asked his disciples, 'Who do people say the Son of Man is?'<sup>14</sup> They replied, 'Some say John the Baptist; others say Elijah; and still others, Jeremiah or one of the prophets.'<sup>15</sup> 'But what about you?' he asked. 'Who do you say I am?'<sup>16</sup> Simon Peter answered, 'You are the Messiah, the Son of the living God.'<sup>17</sup> Jesus replied, 'Blessed are you, Simon son of Jonah, for this was not revealed to you by flesh and blood, but by my Father in heaven.

## REFLECTION ON THE READINGS: SABELO NTANJANA – LOCAL PREACHER

The theme of "taming the tongue" resonates deeply in James 3:1-12 and finds a complementary perspective in Matthew 16:13-17. These passages challenge us to reflect on the power of our words and the source of our confessions, urging us to align our speech with God's truth and wisdom.

The passage in James 3 calls for intentionally taming the tongue, a task James suggests is nearly impossible without divine help (James 3:8). As believers, we are urged to seek God's wisdom to purify our hearts, for "*out of the abundance of the heart the mouth speaks*" (Matthew 12:34). Taming the tongue begins with a transformed heart, rooted in humility and dependence on God. Matthew 16 complements James by showing the positive potential of the tongue when it is surrendered to God.

Peter's confession becomes the foundation for the Church (Matthew 16:18), illustrating how Spirit-led words can have eternal impact. It invites us to consider how our speech can testify to God's truth and identity in our daily interactions.

Together, these passages call us to a higher standard of speech (or not speaking). James reminds us of the tongue's destructive potential and the need for vigilance, while Matthew highlights its capacity to proclaim truth when guided by God.

Taming the tongue requires us to:

- **Examine Our Hearts**: Our words reflect our inner state. Are we cultivating hearts filled with love, humility, and faith, or are we allowing bitterness, pride, or anger to shape our speech?
- Seek God's Wisdom: Like Peter, we need divine revelation to speak truth. Prayer and immersion in Scripture align our words with God's will.
- **Practice Intentionality**: We must pause before speaking, asking whether our words build up or tear down, bless or curse.
- **Confess Christ**: Our speech should reflect our identity as followers of Jesus, pointing others to Him through words of grace, truth, and love.

**Application:** Reflect on a recent conversation where your words had a significant impact positive or negative. How did they reflect your heart at that moment? Consider praying for God's help to tame your tongue, asking for wisdom to speak words that honour Him and bless others. Like Peter, seek moments to boldly confess Christ's identity through your words, whether in sharing your faith or encouraging someone in love. May our tongues be instruments of God's grace, proclaiming His truth and reflecting His love in all we say, in Jesus' name Amen.

### SMALL GROUP QUESTIONS

- 1. How have my words recently reflected the state of my heart, and what changes might I need to make to align my speech with God's love and truth?
- 2. In what situations do I struggle most to control my tongue, and how can I seek God's wisdom to respond with grace in those moments?
- 3. How can I use my words to boldly confess Christ's identity, like Peter, in my daily interactions with others?
- 4. What practical steps can I take to pause and evaluate my words before speaking, ensuring they build up rather than tear down?

**Scripture:** "Death and life are in the power of the tongue, and those who love it will eat its fruit." — Proverbs 18:21 (ESV)

# Explanation

What if I told you that you could shape your future with your words? That the things you speak—about yourself, about others and about your circumstances—are not just sounds, but seeds?

Proverbs 18:21 reminds us that "*death and life are in the power of the tongue*." Our words carry weight. They can build up or tear down, heal or harm, bless or curse. And the fruit of those words? We'll eat it. We'll live in it.

So, what are you speaking over your life today? Are you declaring hope, purpose, and truth? Or are you unknowingly sowing fear, doubt, and discouragement?
