WEEK 4 26 OCTOBER - REMOVING BARRIERS AND BUILDING BRIDGES FOR RENEWAL



Psalm 100:4-5, "Enter His gates with praise...His goodness endures forever, and His faithfulness to all generations".

Thessalonians 5:16-18, Always rejoice.... give thanks to God for all things"

Matthew 13:1-13, vv. "A farmer went out to sow. And as he sowed, some seeds fell along the path, and the birds came and devoured them. Other seeds fell on rocky ground, where they did not have much soil, and immediately they sprang up, since they had no depth of soil. Still other seed fell on good soil, where it produced a crop..."

We begin this month of October in a celebration mood as we commemorate the 69th birthday of Bryanston Methodist Church. Generally, church birthdays hold a special place in the life of a congregation. They are opportunities to reflect on the faithfulness of God, celebrate milestones, and envision the future. With every passing year, we have a chance to share our stories of how God has worked in our lives.

witness, and recounting God's work. We celebrate BMC's missional calling through outward-focused worship that leads to action.

As we step into the final week of celebrating Bryanston Methodist Church's 69th anniversary, we are reminded that this moment is not only about looking back on God's faithfulness, but also about looking forward with hope and courage. Renewal begins when we recognize that God has called each of us, not by accident, but by divine purpose.

In Isaiah 41, God assures us that He has chosen us, taken us from the ends of the earth, and called us to be His servants. We do not stand on the periphery; we belong. Therefore, we need not fear nor feel inadequate, for God Himself strengthens and upholds us.

With this confidence, we are called to build bridges, between the church and the world, between faith and action, between tradition and transformation. This is not easy work. It demands courage, persistence, and spiritual readiness. That's why Ephesians 6 reminds us to put on the full armour of God: the belt of truth, the breastplate of righteousness, the shoes of peace, the shield of faith, the helmet of salvation, and the sword of the Spirit.

These are not just symbols, they are tools for mission. They prepare us to engage the world with love, truth, and conviction. When we are fully clothed in God's armour, we can remove barriers and extend bridges of compassion, understanding, and grace.

As Psalm 119 reminds us, God's Word is a lamp to our feet and a light to our path, it guides us as we go out into the world to fulfil the Great Commission in Matthew 28. We are sent to make disciples, to serve with humility, and to bring others across the bridge, to the table of the Lord, where all are welcome.

So, as we celebrate this anniversary, let us also recommit ourselves to being bridge-builders, those who bring light where there is darkness, hope where there is despair, and renewal where there is brokenness. May next year's celebration find our table larger and our hearts even more open to God's mission in the world.

- **4.** How can we ensure that our celebration of God's faithfulness translates into ongoing service, outreach, and renewal throughout the coming year?

Scripture Readings:

• Psalm 119:105-112

Isaiah 41:1–10

• Ephesians 6:10–18

Matthew 28:19–20

Opening Prayer

Lord, help us see the barriers that keep us and others from fully experiencing Your love. Teach us to build bridges of kindness, service, and faith, so that we may share Your Good News and bring renewal to our families, church, and community. Amen.

Short Summary of the Readings

- **Psalm 119:105–112:** God's Word is a lamp to our feet and a light for our path. It guides us in faith, strengthens our commitment, and helps us remain steadfast even in challenging times.
- Isaiah 41:1–10: God promises His presence, strength, and help to His people. We do not need to fear because He upholds us and empowers us to face obstacles with courage.
- **Ephesians 6:10–18:** Paul encourages believers to put on the full armour of God truth, righteousness, peace, faith, salvation, and the Word of God to stand strong against challenges and obstacles.
- Matthew 28:19–20: The Great Commission calls us to go into the world, make disciples, and teach others God's ways. It reminds us that God's presence is always with us as we serve and share His love.

Reflection

This church anniversary is a time to celebrate growth, transformation, and the potential for renewal. It is both a look back at God's faithfulness and a look forward to the work He is calling us to do.

We are called to:

- **Remove barriers** that prevent people from experiencing God's love social, cultural, personal, or spiritual obstacles.
- Build bridges to reach others, serve the marginalized, and share the Good News.
- **Serve the next generation** by transmitting traditions of faith, teaching others, and living examples of God's love.

Celebrating the church is not just about looking inward; it is about stepping outward in service and compassion. Like the Great Commission teaches, we are ambassadors for Christ — instruments of God's love, bringing renewal and hope to the world. Our faith is what sets us apart, strengthens us, and carries us forward as a community of believers.

Discussion Questions

For Teenagers:

- I. What barriers do you see in your life or community that prevent people from experiencing God's love?
- 2. How can you personally help build bridges of kindness and faith?
- 3. Why is it important to pass on faith to the next generation?
- 4. How can putting on the "Armor of God" (Ephesians 6) help you face challenges in school or friendships?

For Younger Children:

- I. Can you think of someone who needs help or kindness? How can you reach out to them?
- 2. What is one way you can show God's love to your friends or family this week?
- 3. How does it feel to know God is always with you when you try to do good things?
- 4. Can you name one thing you want to learn about God and share with someone else?

Family Activity Ideas

- 1. **Bridge of Kindness** Create a paper bridge with each plank representing an act of kindness your family can do this week.
- 2. **Armor of God Craft** Make a simple craft representing the pieces of God's armour and discuss how each helps you live faithfully.
- 3. **Community Walk** Take a walk and identify people or places in your community that might need help or encouragement. Pray for ways your family can serve.
- 4. **Story Sharing** Share stories of how God has helped people in your family, church, or neighbourhood overcome barriers.
